son (Rodion) joined them here in America. Ruslan wanted nothing to do with our church, but Katya and both children came to our services each week. As time passed, Katya was saved and began to change. Rodion was saved, and Ruslan became friendly and sometimes came to church. After they moved from Brooklyn

to Manhattan, they came only rarely, but would sometimes watch our services online. They moved back to Brooklyn and had another son but rarely came to church. Covid happened. Dan texted them earlier this month, and Katya replied by saying that she and Ruslan had been in a car accident two days previously. They were not seriously hurt, and that weekend, they came to church. After leaving church, Katya called Dan later that afternoon and said that Iolanta wanted to be baptized! During their long absence from our church, she continued to listen to our online services with her Dad. We arranged a time for Sherry to talk to Iolanta, and she led her to Christ! We are planning to baptize her in a couple of weeks, along with two others who have placed their faith in Christ. Please continue to pray for Ruslan to be saved!

Ye rejoice that in the past month, we have seen a few people returning to church whom we have not seen for the past year. Although we began meeting together again nine months ago, there are many who have continued to stay away since Covid closed our doors last March.
